

Michael G. Stewart, MD, MPH is Professor and Chairman of the Department of Otolaryngology-Head & Neck Surgery at Weill Cornell Medical College. He also serves as Senior Associate Dean for International Affairs and Affiliations for the Medical College, and as Otolaryngologist-in-Chief at NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital/Weill Cornell Medical Center. He received a B.E. degree summa cum laude from Vanderbilt University, and an M.D. from Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. He completed residency training at Baylor College of Medicine and received his M.P.H. degree from the University of Texas School of Public Health, Houston.

Dr. Stewart's clinical practice is comprehensive otolaryngology, and he has particular interest in nose and sinus disease. He is the author of 2 textbooks, and more than 30 book chapters and 130 peer-reviewed publications. He is the former Editor-in-Chief of *The Laryngoscope* journal and he also served as Associate Editor and on the Editorial Boards of several other journals. He is a former Director and the Past-President of the American Board of Otolaryngology – Head & Neck Surgery and is also a Past-President of both the Association of Academic Departments of Oto-HNS and the Society of University Otolaryngologists. He was an elected member of the Board of Directors of the American Academy of Otolaryngology - Head & Neck Surgery (AAOHNS) from 2011-15 and of the American Rhinologic Society from 2011-16, and he also served on the Council of the Triological Society from 2010-19. He was an appointed member of the Eye Care and Ear Nose and Throat Conditions subcommittee of the National Quality Forum from 2015-18, and he was a member of the ACGME Residency Review Committee for Oto-HNS from 2016-22. He is currently serving in his second term as the Executive Vice President of the American Rhinologic Society. Dr. Stewart is also the Founder and Medical Director of the Center for the Performing Artist at NewYork- Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, which is a multidisciplinary center caring for the musical needs of singers, musicians, dancers, and other performers.

Dr. Stewart's research interest is in outcomes and quality-of-life research, and he has received research funding from the NIH and AHRQ among others. Dr. Stewart has received many awards and honors, including two Distinguished Service Awards from the AAOHNS and Presidential and Vice-Presidential Citations from four different national societies. He has been listed in Castle Connolly's America's Best Doctors in America for each of the past 17 years. He has been a visiting professor at more than 40 institutions and has given more than 500 invited lectures nationally and internationally.
